Intensification of the fight against cannabis growers

The fight against illegal cannabis cultivation has intensified in Cameroon's Far North region, with security forces stepping up crackdowns on growers and traffickers.

recent large-scale operation by the Mokolo gendarmerie company in the village of Moudji, Bourha District, Mayo-Tsanaga Division, uncovered a vast field of cannabis, leading to multiple arrests and the seizure of a significant quantity of the illicit crop. According to security sources, three suspects believed to be behind the cultivation were taken into custody and are currently being interrogated at the mokolo Gendarmerie headquarters where investigations are ongoing to dismantle possible networks involved in the distribution of cannabis across the region.

Authorities say the operation, described as a "punch action," is part of a wider strategy to combat the cultivation and trafficking of cannabis in border zones where such illegal activities have long thrived. The region's porous frontiers and difficult terrain are believed to facilitate the movement of traffickers, complicating enforcement efforts. Security experts highlight that cannabis production in the Far North is not only a criminal act but also a threat to public health and social stability. Local youths are said to be the most vulnerable, with increasing cases of drug abuse reported in recent years. "It is not just about uprooting plants; it is about saving lives and protecting future generations from addiction," a gendarmerie officer involved in the operation explained.

The government has repeatedly stressed its zero-tolerance stance on drug-re-lated crimes. Over the past five years, several similar operations have been conducted in the northern regions, with hundreds of kilograms of cannabis seized and dozens of traffickers prosecuted. Authorities also insist that dismantling cannabis fields contributes to the wider fight against cross-border criminality, including smuggling and terrorism financing.

For residents of Bourha District, the recent operation is both a relief and a reminder of the scale of the problem. Local community leaders have expressed support for the crackdown but are also calling for preventive measures, including awareness campaigns and



support for alternative livelihoods for farmers tempted by the lucrative drug

As the investigation continues, security forces reaffirm their determination to

maintain pressure on traffickers and growers, ensuring that the Far North region is no longer a safe haven for illegal cannabis cultivation.

FAR NORTH REGION 80 Billion FCFA to link Magada to Yagoua

The Cameroon government has announced an investment exceeding 80 billion FCFA to rehabilitate two crucial road sections connecting Magada to Yagoua in the Far North region.

The project, part of the national effort to modernise road infrastructure, aims to strengthen regional integration and boost socio-economic development.

herehabilitation works cover the Magada-Guidiguis section (68.3 km) and the Guidiguis-Yagoua section (68.7 km), totaling nearly 137 kilometers. According to officials from the Ministry of Public Works (MINTP), these projects are key components of the Territorial Development Plan for the Far North region, co-financed by the Government of Cameroon, the African Development Bank (AfDB), and the European Union (EU).

On the ground, construction companies have already been deployed, and work is gradually progressing despite the region's challenging terrain. The rehabilitation includes the reinforcement of road foundations, the creation of drainage systems, and the installation of durable asphalt surfaces designed to withstand heavy traffic and seasonal flooding.

Officials note that the pro-



ject's overarching goal is to stimulate economic activity and facilitate movement within the region, transforming it into a dynamic and sustainable development hub. By improving accessibility, the upgraded road is expected to significantly reduce travel time and transport costs between Magada and Yagoua, while enhancing connectivity with neighboring countries Chad and Nigeria.

The re'abilitation of the Magada–Yagoua road is also expected to foster the development of new so-

cio-economic infrastructure, including markets, schools, and health centers, which will improve living conditions for local communities.

In line with Cameroon's broader vision of emergence by 2035, the project represents a tangible step toward regional equity and territorial cohesion. As construction progresses, authorities remain optimistic that this major investment will not only transform the Far North's landscape but also serve as a powerful lever for integration, stability, and shared prosperity.

The fear of those past events is now driving their actions, as they work to ensure their families are safe and have enough to eat no matter what follows the election.

BIR Secures coastline against maritime threats

The Rapid Intervention Battalion (BIR) has intensified its presence in Kribi to secure Cameroon's southern coastline against piracy, illegal fishing, resource trafficking, and irregular migration.

he elite unit's operations stretch from Malimba, at the mouth of the Sanaga River, to the Ntem River bordering Equatorial Guinea — a zone that hosts strategic national assets.

At the heart of this mission is the protection of critical infrastructure, notably the deep-sea port of Kribi and surrounding industrial zones, which are vital to Cameroon's economic future. Authorities say the deployment is essential

resident Paul Biya's campaign visit to Maroua on October 6, 2025, was expected to be a moment of political consolidation for the CPDM candidate ahead of the presidential election. Instead, the event unexpectedly turned into a display of popular support for opposition leader Issa Tchiroma Bakary, candidate of the Union for Change 2025 coalition. The streets of Maroua had been decorated with party banners and security reinforced to welcome the Head of State. Schools in the city were instructed to release students early so they could join the rally in large numbers, a common practice



during campaign season. Thousands of young people, dressed in their

uniforms, poured into the streets to give the appearance of strong

mobilization for the CPDM. Yet as the presidential convoy advanced and the rally unfolded, the mood shifted. Instead of cheering for Paul Biya, many students and youths began chanting in favor of Issa Tchiroma Bakary, a native of the Far North and one of the main opposition figures in this year's race. What was meant to be a show of CPDM strength quickly turned into

a spontaneous demonstration of

support for the Union for Change 2025 candidate. Observers noted that the scene highlighted both the weariness of the population toward the ruling party and the growing popularity of Issa Tchiroma Bakary in his home region. Security measures amplified amid election tension

In an official statement released by the Senior Divisional Officer of the Bénoué Division, Oumarou Haman Wabi last Monday, the security alert level in Garoua was raised following credible reports indicating a presidential candidate's alleged plans to disrupt public order with supporters during the electoral period.

uthorities in Garoua have elevated the city's alert level following concerning reports about potential disturbances during the ongoing presidential election period. The Senior Divisional Officer of the Bénoué Division Oumarou Haman Wabi made this announcement Monday after receiving multiple consistent reports indicating one presidential candidate might be planning public disorder activities with supporters. The official release specifically warned that these alleged maneuvers appear aimed at destabilizing Garoua during both the electoral and post electoral periods. In response, the prefect's office issued an unambiguous warning that any calls for violence threatening public peace would be strictly forbidden. The statement made clear that no



acts of vandalism or public disorder would be tolerated, adding that those involved in planning or executing such activities would face severe legal consequences. The SDO's announcement come as a reminder to all presidential candidates of their obligation to operate within legal boundaries, including the requirement to coordinate their campaign

programs with local authorities for proper oversight. While urging residents to continue with their normal daily activities, the administration called for increased public vigilance during this sensitive time. The measures according to the chief officer represent an effort to maintain stability as the October 12 presidential election approaches.

Group condemns candidate's alleged remarks on terrorism

Candidate Issa Tchiroma's visit to the North West has sparked condemnation from human rights organizations over his statements regarding his relationship with separatist fighters in the conflict affected region.

nternational non-governmental organization, Action 237-Suisse has issued a formal caution to 2025 presidential election candidate Issa Tchiroma Bakary concerning his recent statements about alleged connections to armed groups, the organization stated in an official release dated 06 October 2025. The organization, which holds consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council, expressed profound concern over the candidate's alleged remarks regarding his relationships with individuals connected to terrorist activities in the Northwest and Southwest regions of Cameroon. The Geneva-based human rights group characterized these statements as deeply troubling and offensive to the memory of victims who have suffered from violence in the ongoing conflict. While acknowledging the importance of freedom of expression in democratic processes, the organization stressed that



this fundamental right must be balanced with considerations of public security and social stability. The statement particularly emphasized that political discourse should not undermine ongoing efforts to restore peace in affected regions. Action 237-Suisse, which has established itself as a prominent voice in the fight against impunity, reminded the public of its consistent track record in pursuing justice through international legal channels. The organization noted it has previously filed numerous complaints with European judicial bodies against individuals believed to be contributing to

the escalation of violence in Cameroon's Anglophone regions. The statement with a clear warning of the organization's intent to pursue legal action through Cameroonian judicial systems as similar statements continues. Specifically. the organization indicated it would seek charges related to the endorsement of terrorist acts, marking a significant escalation in its response to political public surrounding the ongoing crisis. This situation shows that international observers are paying closer attention to political speeches during Cameroon's election period.

Man arrested for desecrating Biya's effigies

he Regional Division of the Judicial Police, DRPJ has announced that it has apprehended Abdoulaye Abakar, a man accused of desecrating effigies of the Head of State, Paul Biya. A video showing Abdoulaye Abakar tearing up images of President Biya went viral on social media platforms recently, sparking widespread outrage and criticism. The video shows the suspect deliberately destroying official portraits of the president while holding up a photograph of former member of government and candidate in the forthcoming 2025 presidential election, Issa Tchiroma Bakary.



The incident, which unfolded in the heat of the election campaign, has been described as a deliberate provocation and a direct challenge to presidential authority. Public condemnation was swift, with many emphasizing that the President of the Republic, beyond his candidacy status, represents the continuity and dignity of the State. In a recent outing, the DRPJ said it has apprehended the suspect who is believed to be Tchiroma's supporter. Currently held in police custody, Abdoulaye Abakar is accused of multiple offenses, including incitement to hatred, rebellion, insulting constituted bodies, and hostilities against the homeland. Sources indicate he will be presented before the prosecutor in the coming days to face justice.

STRENGTHENING ONLINE OUTREACH State officials trained to counter digital threats

A recent three-day seminar organized by the National Agency for Information and Communication Technology in Kribi has equipped public administration officials with enhanced skills to promote government actions and combat online misinformation.

hana A recent week-long capacity building workshop in Kribi has equipped some 38 communications staff from various ministries with enhanced digital communication skills to strengthen the online presence of public administrations. The training, organized by the National Agency for Information and Communication Technology, ANTIC, focused on practical digital skills for better promoting state actions and countering online misinformation. During the opening ceremony, ANTIC's



Director General Prof Ebot Ebot Enaw acknowledged that though 95% of public services run websites and social media platforms, many are lacking in

content and meaningful digital engagements. The workshop addressed this gap by providing officials with tools to enhance their digital communication strategies. With internet penetration rates rising from 4.5% in 2010 to over 45.6% in 2025, digital platforms have become essential communication chan-

nels. Social media platforms now serve as major interaction spaces, with Cameroon recording more than 5.5 million active users representing 18.5% penetration. The training seminar implemented practical knowledge for participants to better promote government actions, detect fake news and deepfakes, and develop effective digital communication strategies. These efforts according to officials aim to increase engagement rates on administration communication platforms and foster positive citizen sentiment, following the 2016 directive for implementing a more assertive public communication strategy.

Wave of resignations hits APAR

On October 6, 2025, Mouhaman Ndjama, the party's regional president for Adamawa, tendered his resignation in a collective letter addressed to the national president, Célestin Djamen.

he Patriotic and Republican Alliance, APAR, is facing fresh turbulence, with a major wave of resignations shaking its ranks in the Adamawa Region. On October 6, 2025, Mouhaman Ndjama, the party's regional president for Adamawa, tendered his resignation in a collective letter addressed to the national president, Célestin Djamen. "I have taken the firm decision to resign as a member of APAR Adamawa, as well as from my duties as regional president," the letter stated. Ndjama added that his departure also entailed the resignation of all members of the regional bureau and the presidents of seven local cells in Ngaoundéré. The disgruntled activists accuse Djamen of arrogance, contempt toward militants, and unilateral decision-making without consultation. Their main grievance stems from Djamen's rallying of APAR to the G20 coalition without prior discussion. "Mr. President, we are not customers of the APAR store," the activists retorted



in their resignation letter. The controversy traces back to August, when Djamen openly declared his support for the G20, a coalition of political parties that have consistently endorsed President Paul Biya's candidacy since the October 7, 2018, presidential election. Djamen, a former member of both the Social Democratic Front, SDF, and the Cameroon Renaissance Movement CRM, justified his stance by declaring Paul Biva as the best candidate for 2025. This alignment has already triggered

significant departures. Brice Momo, APAR's national coordinator, and Mathias Sadje, departmental coordinator in Mongo in the Littoral Region, both resigned following Djamen's decision. Now, with the Adamawa leadership and grassroots structures breaking away, APAR faces mounting internal fractures that raise questions about its stability and its capacity to rally members in the lead-up to the 2025 political season.

HIGHER EDUCATION Douala University Institute of Technology begins new school year

The University Institute of Technology, IUT of Douala officially launched its academic year at the new Edéa campus on October 6, 2025, in the presence of a host of government and university dignitaries.
